Dear Parents and Carers,

Free School Meals & Pupil Premium Funding

I am writing to you with information about extra funding for your child. We receive extra funding for your child through Pupil Premium funds from the government. This may be for a range of reasons including the following:-

- **Your child is currently entitled to free school meals or has been at some point over the last 6 years.**
- **You are currently a guardian for a child in your care**
- **One or more parents is, or has been, in the Armed Forces**

If your circumstances have changed please consider applying for Free School Meals using the link below.

Schools can receive up to £1320 per pupil. This extra funding available is to benefit your child. The funding is used to support your child's education in a number of ways including:

- Pastoral staff to support Pupil Premium pupils to ensure the care and attendance of our pupils; attendance is strongly linked to academic progress.
- Funding to help academic progress. This includes the provision of smaller class sizes, extra staffing, academic mentoring and educational equipment.
- Funding to support and enhance the delivery of numeracy and literacy skills of pupil premium pupils.
- Provision of enrichment opportunities.
- Social, emotional well-being support.

The last two academic years have been very challenging for everyone and in particular our children. Many have fallen behind not only academically but socially too. We want to ensure we invest as much as possible to ensure they are not disadvantaged by the pandemic. Pupil premium funding coupled with the government catch up funding will ensure that we can deliver high quality, bespoke support where it is needed most. As the furlough scheme comes to an end this may put jobs at risk and increase financial pressure even more.

We are very aware that not all parents apply for or realise that they are entitled to Free School Meals. This may be because your child does not want school meals, you have been receiving universal free school meals and not had to make a claim or you feel there may be a stigma attached to claiming. Many families have seen their financial circumstances change of the last few months so please check the eligibility criteria on the reverse of this letter and consider completing an application. You do not have to take a free school meal for us to claim the grant. It will not affect any other benefits and your child will not be identified in any way to other pupils. The application process is straightforward but if you do need help please call the school office.

Please note that the government have made changes to the entitlement criteria for new free school meal applications from 1 April 2018.

The entitlement criteria from 1 April 2018 is -

- Income Support
- Income Based Job Seekers Allowance
- Income Related Employment and Support Allowance
- eligible for Child Tax Credit **but not** Working Tax Credit and the household income (as used by HMRC to assess tax credits) is not more than £16,190. **Please note:** anyone eligible for Working Tax Credit, or if you have a partner and they receive it, regardless of Income, you will not qualify
- The Guarantee element of State Pension Credit
- Support under part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- In receipt of the 4 week run on of working tax credit (this is where someone becomes unemployed or reduces their hours and so is no longer entitled to working tax credit but will continue to receive it for a further 4 weeks and is entitled to free meals during that time)
- Universal credit (provided you have an annual net earned household income of no more than £7,400 as assessed by earnings from up to three of your most recent assessment periods). Your net earned income is your household income after taxes and deductions and does not include income from Universal Credit or any other benefits you may receive.
